January Program

Note New Meeting Place and Time

Our resident orchid conservationist extraordinaire, AARON HICKS, will present a program on the conservation work that he's doing with Spiranthes *delitescens*. For those of you who didn't receive our November, 2008 newsletter and didn't read Aaron's biographical notes, this issue contains a repeat of the comments in the November newsletter.

Aaron's addiction with orchids began at the age of 12. While he was in graduate school, his addiction was dormant. In 1994, his passion for orchids was rekindled with an introduction to the Internet.

In December, 1996, Aaron recognized the need to preserve seeds of orchid species and started the Orchid Seedbank Project in Socorro, NM. (Until the OSP was formed, there was no central clearinghouse by which conservationists, researchers, commercial and hobbyist growers could go to specifically for orchid seed.) The OSP, currently located in Chandler, AZ, is an orchid seed clearinghouse for growers interested in orchid conservation. Aaron has advanced degrees in a variety of scientific disciplines and OSA members fondly refer to him as "our mad scientist". When he used to have time for hobbies, he was a volunteer firefighter and rescue worker. The OSP's website is a treasure trove of information, including descriptions of Aaron's experiments with gathering, preserving, classifying, distributing, and exchanging orchid seeds. He has published numerous papers and three books: Asymbiotic Technique of Orchid Seed Germination, Orchid Seed Germination Media, and The Orchid Seed Germination Manual. In the May, 1999, issue of Orchids magazine, there is a feature article on the Orchid Seedbank Project. The OSP was also featured in the July, 2003 issue of Phoenix Home and Garden Magazine. Since 1995, the Arizona State Veteran Home has been caring for veterans who can no longer care for themselves. Our mission is to serve America's heroes by providing compassionate, professional care in a comfortable home-like environment. It is difficult for these men and women, who in their younger years fought to keep America free, to now admit that they need the help of professional nurses 24 hours a day. The Recreation Department is honored to have the Orchid Society of Arizona as such an integral part of our program to enrich the lives of ASVH residents."



DENDROBIUM LEAF DROP

Dendrobiums are "cane" orchids which store their energy in tall bamboo type canes. The Phalaenopsis varieties with flowers and long inflorescences resembling Phals will drop their leaves when the temperature goes below 50 degrees Fahrenheit or 10 degrees Celsius. In their native habitat the temperature rarely goes below 60 degrees Fahrenheit and they need year round watering and fertilizer as well as warm temperatures. They will also tend to lose leaves if the humidity is too low, so this is something that indoor growers should watch out for. Leaf loss is simply a mechanism to preserve their energy and does no harm to the plant. They will generally bloom on the old back bulbs, so don't cut them off.


