GROWING ORCHIDS FROM SEED

Did the article in last month's newsletter interest you?

Well, we have *the* expert in the subject, our very own Aaron J. Hicks, director of the Orchid Seed Bank Project in Chandler and author of *Asymbiotic Technique of Orchid Seed Germination*.

"Largely considered the most dangerous seed bank in the entire southwest, the OSP has been busy collecting and redistributing orchid species seed for the purpose of conservation since 1996.

In this period of time, the OSP has amassed a collection of over ten million seeds of several hundred species, and produced hundreds of thousands of propagules for researchers, conservationists, commercial growers, and hobbyists"

ISLE PLANT, FLOWER VALUES FALL 9%

The value of Hawai'i's floriculture and nursery products fell to \$98.6 million in 2008, a 9 percent decline from 2007's record-setting performance, according to a report from the local office of the National Agricultural Statistics Service. Growers said a number of factors led to the decline, including the generally sluggish economy, crop losses to volcanic emissions, and other adverse weather conditions. Despite the decline, the NASS said "the industry still remains a major contributor to Hawai'i's diversified agriculture".

The \$108.7 million produced by the industry in 2007 was a record for the industry, which has generated more than \$95 million a year in each of the past five years.

Orchids, the largest single category, were valued at \$19.1 million in 2008, an 11 percent decline from 2007. Cut flowers were valued at \$10 million, down 18 percent from 2007.

2009 Orchid Publications

During our July 6 meeting, two 2009 orchid books will be available for viewing.

- 1) ORCHID BIOLOGY
Reviews and Perspectives, Volume X,
446 pages, hard cover,
Springer Publishing Co., Warren, MI

For those growers who are interested in orchid science and/or own or at least have seen the previous 9 volumes in this series, a few of the topics included in volume X are: Pollination Effects on Orchid Flowers and the First Suggestion by Professor Hans Fitting (1877-1970) that Plants Produce Hormones; Food-Hair Form and Diversification in Orchids; Orchids Pollen Dispersal Units and Reproductive Consequences; Hand-Pollination of Vanilla: How Many Discoverers?; and Molecular Biology of Two Orchid Infecting Viruses: Cymbidium Mosaic Potexvirus and Odontoglossum Ringspot Tobamovirus. At the back of Volume X is an index to the articles contained in ALL 10 volumes of the series. (All volumes are approximately the same size and can easily fit on a book shelf.)

- 2) Proceedings of THE 19TH WORLD ORCHID CONFERENCE,
504 pages, **oversized** hard cover book in a slip cover case,
Published by American Printing Arts, Miami, FL

The 19th World Orchid Conference was held in Miami in January, 2008, but the Proceedings were not available until June, 2009. Abstracts submitted by the WOC speakers are located between pages 293-439. For readers not interested in the abstracts, there are numerous color photos of orchids, displays of orchids, and people.

The Nature Conservancy at Work in Arizona

In the summer, 2009 issue, page 66, TNC announced that it had purchased 122 critical acres along the San Pedro River. TNC also thanked the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Endangered Species Recovery funds and the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation for their collaborative efforts. Subsequently, TNC transferred the property to the Arizona Game and Fish Department. (In the event that you did not know, the San Pedro is one of the last free-flowing rivers in the Southwest.)

OSA is a member of The Nature Conservancy, and as such, we receive "**Field Notes for Members of the Nature Conservancy in Arizona**". In the summer issue of "Field Notes", pages 8 and 9, there is an interesting article about the Verde River. The article caught my attention because of the play-on-words used in the lead-in to the article: "What do you call an Arizona river and its system of plants, animals, and fish that are starting to recover after decades of human intervention? In the case of the Verde River, which flows from northern Arizona to near the Phoenix metro area, you could call it an 'otter' success."
