JUNE PROGRAM

The "How To" on Mounting Orchids

This program may be a review for some members, and for others it may be your first opportunity to see how to mount an orchid. In nature, most orchids are found growing in a mounted fashion. You will find their roots clinging to the bark of trees and shrubs, on the side outcropping of rock cliffs, all without the benefit of fir bark and terra-cotta pots.

Mounted orchids do have benefits not afforded a regularly potted orchid. Mounting simulates nature's way of perfect drainage during watering. As you may imagine, water does not accumulate in the crown of the plants during watering, therefore crown rot is minimized if not eliminated altogether. A grower must take into consideration that with the faster drainage, a mounted orchid requires more frequent waterings, and will benefit from a higher humidity range. You will have to decide if your growing environment can provide a mounted orchid's needs, but everyone can benefit from learning the basics of mounting orchids.

We look forward to seeing you in June. As usual, we love having an interactive meeting and would like your input or questions regarding mounting orchids. Let us know if you have had success, or not, in growing your plants in this manner.

ADDENDUM to the May Article on Pressing an Orchid Specimen

After reading the May article on Pressing an Orchid Specimen, **John Atwood** added the following comments: "One thing I have done if I have a freezer handy is to actually freeze the plant after removing the inflorescence for separate pressing. Sometimes these orchids are so resilient [resistant?] to drying that even after several days, they can germinate on the herbarium sheet! That once happened to me with *Oncidium cebolleta* and *Laelia rubescens*. I only used the freezing method when I had grown the plants myself and, of course, had a freezer handy. "

Editor's Note: Not mentioned in our May newsletter- the pressed specimen of *C. bicolor v. brasiliensis* was sent to SEL in 1998.

GROWING BLETILLA ORCHIDS IN THE LOW DESERT



Yokohama 'Kate'

OSA member, Bob MacLeod, became interested in growing Asian terrestrial orchids. Since it is widely known amongst OSA members that Bob does not use the internet, the only catalog in which he could find Bletilla orchids was in a hard copy that he received from a general plant nursery in CT. At different times, he ordered several different Bletilla orchids, and he gave one to OSA member, Seelye Smith. Bob didn't have luck growing his Bletilla orchids outside, but he had success growing them indoors. Seelye chose to plant her Bletilla outside in a mixture of compost, perlite, and sand. Seelye's Bletilla Yokohama 'Kate' p.p.a.f. (plant patent applied for) rebloomed this year, and there were more flowers than last year, and the plant itself was much larger. Bletilla Yokohama is a hybrid of *striata*

and *formosana*. The photos of Bob's plant are also labeled as Bletilla Yokohama

'Kate', but the flowers on his plant are white. The seller might have mislabeled Bob's plant. (Bletilla *striata* is typically purple, but a pigment-free white color is available.)

According to the Internet Orchid Species Photo website <http://orchidspecies.com>, there are 9 species in this genus. Each has plicate ("pleated") leaves and a corm at the base of the stem. An internet search revealed several websites that include Bletilla culture tips. One of those websites is <http://culturesheet.org/orchidaceae:bletilla>. There are also websites that offer both species and hybrids. Bletilla *Striata* 'Big Bob' blooms 2-3 weeks earlier than 'Kate' and has larger blooms. (Bletillas are dormant in winter.)

Editors Note: The New Mexico Orchid Guild offered members Bletilla seedlings of Ble.striata 'Big Bob' and Ble ochracea.... Members were instructed that the plants needed a winter cold "snap" similar to tulips and daffodils in order to bloom. It will be interesting to see if New Mexico culture can produce flowers any where near as spectacular as these!
