REMEMBER MEETINGS NOW BEGIN AT 6:45 PM

Ever wonder where orchid seedlings come from?

"Yeah, me, neither. But the November talk is still going to be a presentation on orchid seedlings: where they come from, how they're made, and why the best people to run a flasking lab always smell like bleach." Aaron Hicks

Rumor has it that Aaron was born in a library! His addiction with orchids began at the age of 12. While he was in graduate school, his addiction was dormant. In 1994, his passion for orchids was rekindled with an introduction to the Internet.

In December, 1996, Aaron recognized the need to preserve seeds of orchid species and started the Orchid Seedbank Project in Socorro, NM. (Until the OSP was formed, there was no central clearinghouse by which conservationists, researchers, commercial and hobbyist growers could go to specifically for orchid seed.) The OSP, currently located in Chandler, AZ, is an orchid seed clearinghouse for growers interested in orchid conservation. Aaron has advanced degrees in a variety of scientific disciplines and OSA members fondly refer to him as "our mad scientist". When he used to have time for hobbies, he was a volunteer firefighter and rescue worker. The OSP's website is a treasure trove of information, including descriptions of Aaron's experiments with gathering, preserving, classifying, distributing, and exchanging orchid seeds. He has published numerous papers and three books: **Asymbiotic Technique of Orchid Seed Germination**, **Orchid Seed Germination Media**, and **The Orchid Seed Germination Manual**. In the May, 1999, issue of *Orchids* magazine, there is a feature article on the Orchid Seedbank Project. The OSP was also featured in the July, 2003 issue of *Phoenix Home and Garden Magazine*. 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From the President's Desk

For those of you who didn't attend our October 6th meeting, you missed one of the largest donations of plants - both in the number and size of the plants - on the raffle table that we have ever had! The plants were donated to OSA by the **Northern Arizona VA Health Care System greenhouse** in Prescott. Paula Moran, Current Recreation Therapy Supervisor at NAVAHCS, asked OSA Board Members for our help with the orchids in the greenhouse. On September 13th, Wilella Stimmell and I responded to her call for help. **Betty Stephens**, former Recreation Therapy Supervisor, offered her assistance. She met us at the greenhouse, unlocked it, and watched in awe as we quickly dispatched plants with crown rot to the trash bin. Betty disposed of the trash. Then we organized the remaining plants and placed all Phalaenopsis plants in one spot on the benches, all Cattleyas in another place, all Dendrobiums in yet another position, and when we had finished reorganizing, the center bench held only Oncidiums, and the Cymbidiums were placed on the floor. After not receiving attention for so long, the VA orchids were surprisingly free of scale and mealybugs, and we found only two giant snails that had dined on orchid flowers. We had taken a gallon of rubbing alcohol to be used to remove scale and mealybugs, but we used very little alcohol because the plants were clean. We discovered that the orchids had either been overwatered or underwatered. The plants that were on the October raffle table were given to us in appreciation for our efforts at reorganizing the collection. Even after the donated plants had been removed from the VA greenhouse, the orchid collection remaining in the greenhouse looked like no plants had been removed! I had been storing the donated plants in my greenhouse until October 6th, the day that we returned from Landers. The donated plants took up a LOT of space, so on the 6th, the NAVAHCS plants were moved out of my greenhouse and into my vehicle; then there was room in my greenhouse for our November show plants.

Joe Bacik, Keith Mead, Lou Ann Remeikis, Wilella Stimmell, and I represented our school program team on October 4th and 5th at the 13th Annual Morongo Basin Orchid Festival in Landers. Keith drove over to Phoenix from Albuquerque, and he rode with Joe in Joe's new vehicle to Landers. Lou Ann and Wilella rode with me in my truck. My horse trailer was hitched to my truck, and other than the fact that I made a turn that brought the front of the horse trailer into contact with the back window of my truck, the ride to Landers was smooth. Thanks, Joe, for having a roll of duct tape and a tarp to cover the broken window in my truck!

We returned from Landers on the day of our meeting, and all of us were exhausted. Keith still had another 7 hour drive ahead of him in order for him to return home to Albuquerque and go to work the next day. The Festival was a huge success, and although we worked like busy beavers, all of us felt that our efforts were greatly appreciated. Keith is already planning for next year's trip to Landers, and Heidi Gubler Brodeur (who refers to herself as "Little Miss Organized") is already starting to organize the schedule for next year's classes!

For a sneak preview of the king size orchid quilt that will be raffled at our December 1 auction, I brought the quilt to the meeting. I showed the quilt to members, but I forgot to mention that I also brought the quilt raffle tickets. They're PURPLE and were located on the raffle ticket sales table. They'll be on the raffle ticket table for our November meeting, so if I forget again to mention the quilt tickets, please look for the roll of purple tickets! (The first tickets were purchased by AFGC's webmaster, Carolyn Kawahara, a resident of New Jersey!) We hope to sell a lot of raffle tickets and that the sale of tickets will raise money for our Treasury!

At our October meeting, Barbara Parnell, November 2008 Show Chair, passed around a sign up sheet for show workers. At our November meeting, you'll have another chance to sign up to work. (Our show is AFTER our November meeting.) We need your help!

Our November meeting will be held in Liberty Hall at the Arizona State Veteran Home. During the meeting, we will hold our election for OSA's 2009 Board of Directors. Aaron Hicks will present the program for the meeting.

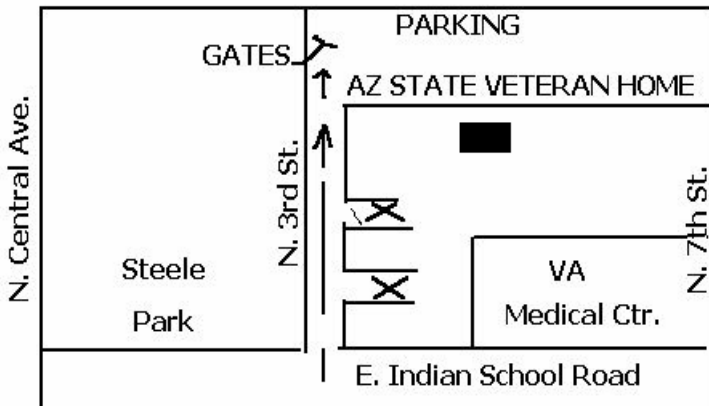

Everyone admired our blooming display plants and expressed interest in attending our November show. Karen said that she would try to arrange a bus so that the residents could attend our show. A gentleman resident won the doorprize plant. Everyone seemed to enjoy our program, and we were pleased to have introduced the residents to orchids.

The residents would appreciate any of the following: Musical DVDs from the 40's and 50's and classical music; DVD movies – western, Don Knotts, Marilyn Monroe, Elvis Presley, etc.; sponsor a fast food lunch – specify the number of lunches at \$5 per lunch (sometimes the veterans crave fast food); RF converter cords – specify the number of cords at \$20 per cord (150 cords are needed for residents to watch DVDs in their rooms); sports equipment packages - \$200 for large exercise balls and target games were mentioned; a portable piano - \$700; and monthly sponsorship for various services. (In September, the American Legion Auxiliary sponsored a photography program, and the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War sponsored 10 fast food meals.) Morongo Basin Orchid Festival an Overwhelming Success: Netting Over \$12,000 for Charity!

Yucca Valley, California, October 10th, 2008

The 13th Annual Morongo Basin Orchid Festival broke another fundraising record this year netting \$12,467.59 for charitable causes. This represents an increase of more than 7% from last year's figures. "We are unequivocally delighted with the outcome of this year's festival!" exclaimed Charles Willis, President of the Sunset Rotary Club in Yucca Valley who sponsors the festival alongside Gubler Orchids. "This year the corporate sponsorship of the festival reached new heights, pushing our profit figure well over that from years when the economy was burgeoning. Despite a worsening economy, it's wonderful that people continue to make the choice to lend a hand to those in greater need than themselves, even though it necessarily means tightening their own belts." Corporate sponsors this year include Costco, Gubler Orchids, Libbey Inc., McDonalds, Pacific Western Bank, and Trader Joe's. Our media sponsors, Hi-Desert Star and Z107.7, did a tremendous job publicizing the event and were a definite force behind the increased festival attendance.

Public support blossomed with the addition of "Rotary Bucks" to the festival. This year the festival hosted 15 charities who registered ahead of time to have booths at the festival. Festival goers received Rotary Bucks for spending money on orchids, food, and drink, and in turn they "donated" the Bucks to the charities of their choice. The Rotary Club will exchange each of the Bucks for no less than one real dollar within the next few weeks. The tightened economy did significantly lower the sales of the higher ticket orchids that have been a mainstay of the festival. However, even though the orchid sales were down this year, the festival was boosted by an almost doubling of the food and the wine & cheese tasting sales. "While both the Gubler Orchids' staff and our entire eleven-member Rotary club work exceedingly hard to make this event a success, it is in fact the people and businesses of the entire Morongo Basin and the lower desert that we have to thank. Their support, attendance, and donations make this all possible and allow us to serve the people of our communities," said Chris Gubler. "It truly is a win-win for everyone participating in the festival, and that is what it is all about."
